### **Endnotes**

Use endnotes sparingly and keep them short. Use endnotes if you want to give further explanations or supplementary information to the reader who wants to get deeper into the topic.

## References

List all resources you have cited at the end of your work in alphabetical order.

Order resources by the same author chronologically (beginning with the earliest) and by small letters (2001a, 2001b) if more than one work has been published in the same year.

Please follow this general form: Last names, initials (Year): Title. Place of publishing: Name of publisher.

Example: Brookfield, S. D. (1986): Understanding and Facilitating Adult Learning. San Francisco: Jossey-Bass Publishers.
